## **Toxic shellfish found – public advised to avoid eating wild shellfish from Peel-Harvey Estuary**

The Health Department has advised people not to eat wild shellfish including mussels, after tests confirmed the presence of toxins caused by algae in samples taken from the Peel region.

## **Fremantle boat launching area included in plans for public comment**

Three concept plans have been released for public comment. The preferred option will lead to a 30-year plan that will have up to five new breakwaters built farther out to sea to create sheltered harbours for commercial and recreational boats. Includes recreational boat launching on the southern boundary of Success Harbour.

## **Geraldton public briefing on recreational fishing rules for at risk demersal fish**

Starts 5 pm Thursday, 25 October at the African Reef Resort Hotel, Tarcoola Beach. Fisheries managers and researchers will hold a public briefing to outline important research on 'at risk' WA demersal fish stocks, and the need for new options to manage recreational catches sustainably. No decisions would be made on long-term strategies until the Fisheries Minister had reviewed community comment on this discussion paper and on a further paper to be issued early next year summarising the submissions and feedback received.

## **Court order bans repeat offender from fishing**

A 40 year-old man has been fined \$9,100 and prohibited from fishing for abalone in Western Australia under an order by a Joondalup court. This was a second similar offence. The order was issued under Section 225 of the Fish Resources Management Act because the offence was serious and he hadn't learnt his lesson.

The Great Australian Shark Count will involve community monitoring by divers, fishers, scientists and conservationists; and provide the community, managers and decision makers with a valuable data source. Aust Underwater Federation has been granted financial support of \$70,000 for ongoing education and monitoring.

## **Taste for shark fin could threaten the species**

A huge appetite for shark fin, mostly in Asia, is making commercial fishing for these creatures increasingly enticing, but critics say it's a recipe for an environmental disaster. Fins fetch between \$40 and \$110 a kilo, but a shark's body brings in between \$1 and \$3 a kilo. There's been a severe decline in some shark species.
